HANDLING OF ANIMALS.

(c)(1) During public exhibition, any animal must be handled so there is minimal risk of harm to the animal and to the public, with sufficient distance and/or barriers between the animal and the general viewing public so as to assure the safety of animals and the public.

This facility allows animals to interact with the public in several ways. Included is the opportunity to be a "trainer for a day", and / or to have a photograph taken with a leashed animal, including the large felids. These activities do not meet the standard of "sufficient distance and/or barriers between the animal and the general viewing public". Leashes do not constitute a barrier. Those participating in one day or photo opportunities are members of the general viewing public. A system must be in place to ensure such activities do not take place.

TO BE CORRECTED FOR ALL FUTURE ACTIVITIES

NOTE: This facility also runs a multiday training course which includes hands-on contact with the animals. A syllabus of the course has been provided, and will be reviewed to determine compliance with handling regulations.

FACILITIES, OUTDOOR.

(d) Perimeter fence. all outdoor housing facilities (i.e., facilities not entirely indoors) must be enclosed by a perimeter fence that is of sufficient height to keep animals and unauthorized persons out. The fence must be constructed so that it protects the animals in the facility by restricting animals and unauthorized persons from going through it or under it and having contact with the animals in the facility, and so that it can function as a secondary containment system for the animals in the facility. It must be of sufficient distance from the outside of the primary enclosure to prevent physical contact between animals inside the enclosure and animals or persons outside the perimeter fence. Such fences less than 3 feet in distance from the primary enclosure must be approved in writing by the Administrator.

New enclosure, lower level, adjacent to barn: Perimeter fence for this enclosure is less than 3 feet from enclosure, creating the possibility of unauthorized access to animals in the enclosure through the perimeter fence. Perimeter fence must be constructed to block access to animals by unauthorized persons.

FEEDING.

(b) Food, and food receptacles, if used, shall be sufficient in quantity and located so as to be accessible to all animals in the enclosure and shall be placed so as to minimize contamination. Food receptacles shall be kept clean and sanitary at all times.

Felids in upper area are fed through feed tubes, with meat landing on wood floor. Wood is not sealed adequately for sanitation, and food debris may fall through gaps in wood floor. A system must be in place to ensure feeding areas can be sanitized.

WATERING.

***All water receptacles shall be kept clean and sanitary. ***

Tiger enclosure, pool: water was green, semi-opaque, and the bottom of the pool could not be seen through the water. Although an alternate source of drinking water is available, pool must be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition. A system of routine cleaning must be in place.

SANITATION.

***(c) Housekeeping. Premises (buildings and grounds) shall be kept clean and in good repair in order to protect the animals from injury and to facilitate the prescribed husbandry practices set forth in this subpart. ***

Kitchen area: walls behind food prep area are not sealed effectively. This area is used for meat preparation, among other items. Food debris cannot be adequately sanitized in areas with unsealed wood. A system must be in place to ensure husbandry practices can be maintained.
