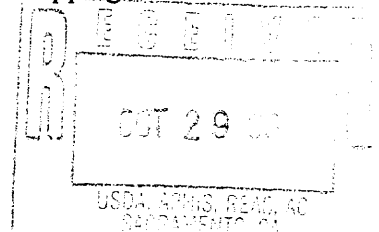

I. Corrected Items:

- #10 Structure and Construction 3.125 (a)
 - Rust corrected in felid enclosures
 - Chain link fencing and vertical space at one end of gate for elk has been repaired
- #13 Storage 3.125 (c)
 - Vermin infestation in the grain commissary has been eradicated
- #23 Shelter from Elements 3.127 (b)
 - Adequate shelter has been provided for the elk
 - Adequate shelter has been provided for the buffalo
- #24 Drainage 3.127 (c)
 - A cement pad has been installed to provide a dry area under the shelter for the elk
- #35 Watering 3.130
 - Potable water is now provided for the buffalo
- #36 Cleaning and Sanitation 3.131 (a)
 - The Addax shelter has clean, dry bedding
- #37 Housekeeping and Pest Control 3.131 (c) and (d)
 - The insect infestation in the grain commissary has been eradicated
 - Subsequent to improving the vent opening grill, there are no rodent droppings visible indicating an effective rodent control program
 - Previously observed rodent droppings have been removed and no new droppings are visible
- #46 Records 2.75 (b)
 - The Corsican sheep death is noted in the records.
- #48 Veterinary Care 2.40
 - An effective program for controlling outdated drugs is in place
 - No insanitary injection supplies (needles and syringes) observed

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III. Non-compliant items identified this inspection:

#24 Drainage 3.127 (c)

- A bog surrounds the elk feeder in the Pioneer Village elk enclosure. The elk must stand in the muck while consuming feed. Correct by providing a suitable method of rapidly eliminating excess water which complies with applicable Federal, State, and local laws and regulations relating to pollution control or the protection of the environment by 3-1-98.
- A bog surrounds the elk feeder in the Wild Kingdom elk enclosure. The elk must stand in the muck while consuming feed. Correct as stated above for the other elk enclosure and solve the drainage problem by 3-1-98.

#36 Cleaning and Sanitation 3.131 (a)

- Due to an excessive accumulation of excreta, there is no clean resting area in the shelter for the elk in the Wild Kingdom section. Correct by 10-21-97.
- Due to an excessive accumulation of excreta, there is no clean resting area in the shelter for the camel. Correct by 10-21-97.

#46 Records 2.75 (b)

- The final disposition of the cougar named Kumba (i.e. death by euthanasia) is not recorded. Correct by 10-30-97.
- Acquisition information for the recently acquired llama is not recorded. Correct by 10-30-97.

NOTE: There were 3 elk that were thin enough that their ribs were showing and that also had dry, rough haircoats in the Wild Kingdom elk enclosure. The attending veterinarian indicated that he feels the condition is due to old age and will monitor parasite loads with fecal checks if he feels it is necessary
