Each exhibitor shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include the use of appropriate methods to prevent, control, diagnose, and treat diseases and injuries.

***The ram continues to have overgrown hooves.

Overgrown hooves can cause pain and discomfort to the animals.

The hooves must be trimmed to remove excess growth.

***The male tiger with the call name of "Angel" was acquired February 10, 2010. This animal arrived appearing thin and having multiple veterinary concerns which include but are not limited to: cloudy appearing eyes with poor vision, blisters on multiple foot pads, areas of hair loss observed on the left hip and around the face and head. The tiger also appeared to have difficulty walking and lying down. This animal has not yet been evaluated by the attending veterinarian since its arrival to the facility.

Failure to provide adequate veterinary care does not provide for the health, well-being or comfort of the animal.

The animal must be evaluated by the attending veterinarian and prescribed treatment(s) must be administered.

FACILITIES, OUTDOOR.

Perimeter fence. On or after May 17, 2000, all outdoor housing facilities (i.e., facilities not entirely indoors) must be enclosed by a perimeter fence that is of sufficient height to keep animals and unauthorized persons out. Fences less than 8 feet high for potentially dangerous animals, such as, but not limited to, large felines (e.g., lions, tigers, leopards, cougars, etc.), bears, wolves, rhinoceros, and elephants, or less than 6 feet high for other animals must be approved in writing by the Administrator. The fence must be constructed so that it protects the animals in the facility by restricting animals and unauthorized persons from going through it or under it and having contact with the animals

in the facility, and so that it can function as a secondary containment system for the animals in the facility. It must be of sufficient distance from the outside of the primary enclosure to prevent physical contact between animals inside the enclosure and animals or persons outside the perimeter fence. Such fences less than 3 feet in distance from the primary enclosure must be approved in writing by the Administrator.

There still is not a complete perimeter fence for the large felids and foxes. In addition, a new enclosure was constructed for the tiger acquired on February 10, 2010. The perimeter fence for this animal is not sufficient because of the following reasons, that includes but are not limited to: the perimeter fence for this enclosure is not of sufficient height, it is not attached securely to all fence posts, does not have a secure entrance door, and the perimeter fence does not completely surround the primary enclosure.

Licensee continues to fail to protect the animals by not restricting unauthorized humans and unwanted animals from having contact with the animals at the facility. Also, there is still not a secondary containment system for the animals.

A perimeter fence of sufficient height and of sufficient distance from the enclosures must be constructed.

Records were not reviewed during today's inspection. Therefore, it cannot be determined if the non-human primate enrichment citation from inspection report dated November 19, 2009 has been corrected.

Inspection and exit interview was conducted with licensee, Inspector 1041 and Investigators 3546 and 2233.
