Each exhibitor shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include the use of appropriate methods to prevent, control, diagnose, and treat disease and injuries.

The ram continues to have overgrown hooves.

Over grown hooves can cause pain and discomfort to the animals.

The hooves must be trimmed to remove the excess growth.

ACCESS AND INSPECTION OF RECORDS AND PROPERTY.

Each exhibitor shall allow APHIS officials to examine records required to be kept by the Act and the regulations in this part.

Licensee was unable to produce the written program of veterinary care and the non-human primate environmental enrichment plan.

Records were not able to be reviewed to determine if an adequate program of veterinary care and an adequate non-human environmental enrichment plan are in place.

Records must be made available for review by the Animal Care inspector.

HANDLING OF ANIMALS.

During public exhibition, any animal must be handled so there is minimal risk of harm to the animal and to the public, with sufficient distance and/or barriers between the animal and the general viewing public so as to assure the safety of animals and the public.

There is a lack of public barriers around the enclosures including, but not limited to, the kinkajous, wallabies, opossum, raccoons, and the African porcupine. There are insufficient barriers for the enclosures, including but not limited to, the coatimundi, skunk, fennec foxes and silver fox.

Licensee has failed to ensure the safety of the animals and the general viewing public by not providing adequate public barriers.

Licensee must provide adequate public barriers around all enclosures housing regulated wild and/or exotic animals on public exhibition.

3.127 (d) **REPEAT**

FACILITIES, OUTDOOR.

Perimeter fence. On or after May 17, 2000, all outdoor housing facilities (i.e., facilities not entirely indoors) must be enclosed by a perimeter fence that is of sufficient height to keep animals and unauthorized persons out. Fences less than 8 feet high for potentially dangerous animals, such as, but not limited to, large felines (e.g., lions, tigers, leopards, cougars, etc.), bears, wolves, rhinoceros, and elephants, or less than 6 feet high for other animals must be approved in writing by the Administrator. The fence must be constructed so that it protects the animals in the facility by restricting animals and unauthorized persons from going through it or under it and having contact with the animals in the facility, and so that it can function as a secondary containment system for the animals in the facility. It must be of sufficient distance from the outside of the primary enclosure to prevent physical contact between animals inside the enclosure and animals or persons outside the perimeter fence. Such fences less than 3 feet in distance from the primary enclosure must be approved in writing by the Administrator.

The facility has a perimeter fence variance, but there continues to be a lack of a six foot perimeter fence for animals not included in the variance including, but not limited to, the skunks, wallabies, and the opossum.

Licensee has failed to protect the safety of the animals by not restricting unauthorized humans and unwanted animals from having contact with the animals at the facility, nor does it provide a secondary containment system.

A perimeter fence must be constructed for these animals.
