CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

Premises where housing facilities are located, including buildings and surrounding grounds, must be kept in good repair in order to protect the nonhuman primates from injury, to facilitate the husbandry practices required in this subpart.

There has been no repair of the roof structure, but the licensee is spraying the ceilings of the affected areas with a disinfectant in an effort to control the mold, mildew, fungus, & humidity buildup. Portions of the plywood ceiling in the indoor primate area continue to be in disrepair. These areas of the ceiling were very soft to the touch, and had mold, mildew, &/or fungus due to longstanding wet conditions. While these areas did not leak directly into the animal enclosures, they do pose a risk of respiratory irritation &/or disease to the primates due to the buildup of the humidity, mold, mildew, &/or fungus in this room.

The licensee has indicated that the affected areas of the roof will be replaced by the end of the week.

Time granted still remains for correction. This is to be corrected by June 30, 2013

SANITATION.

Premises (buildings and grounds) shall be kept clean and in good repair in order to protect the animals from injury and to facilitate the prescribed husbandry practices set forth in this subpart. Accumulations of trash shall be placed in designated areas and cleared as necessary to protect the health of the animals.

There was an open trash receptacle, and other equipment/supplies that are being stored outside of the commissary and directly adjacent to the first panther enclosure. In addition, this area is also wet.

These above conditions are contributing the the number of flies that are observed inside and around the first two panther enclosures. Numerous flies were observed on the panther's ears in these 2 enclosures. These animals were observed to be constantly flicking their ears. At the present time, the flies have not caused any ear lesions or wounds, but left untreated frequently do cause lesions, wounds and discomfort to the animals. The facility

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has instituted a fly control program consisting of topical ointments & sprays as well as fly traps, but this has not completely controlled the fly population in this area.

Better housekeeping in this general area can help to reduce the breeding grounds for flies. Covering trash will also greatly help in these efforts. Several other options were discussed and are available for better fly control without compromising the safety of any of the animals at this facility.

Correct by July 1, 2013

This was a focused inspection to inspect all of the non compliant areas identified on the last inspection conducted on May 30, 2013.

The coyote enclosure was been filled in and regraded. No standing water was observed.

Moon & Tundra has received medical care and were put on a fly control program. Their ears are healing and there were no open lesions or wounds observed today.

The exit interview was conducted with the Animal Care & Medical Manager.
