### ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).

(2.40)(b) Each exhibitor shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include:(3) Daily observation of all animals to assess their health and well-being; Provided, however, That daily observation of animals may be accomplished by someone other than the attending veterinarian; and Provided, further, That a mechanism of direct and frequent communication is required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian.

- \*\*\*There is a 19 month old male ringtail lemur identified as "Clyde" housed with 2 other primates. Upon inspection, Clyde's tail is observed to be missing patches of hair along the length of the tail. Abnormal conditions to the haircoat my indicate improper social group housing, poor diet or psychological abnormalties in primates that can lead to additional health problems for the animal. The male lemur "Clyde" must be examined by a veterinarian and appropriate treatment administered. Documentation must be maintained for any health related problems and it must include the following information:
- Identity of the animal.
- Descriptions of the illness or injury.
- Dates, details, and results of examinations, tests, and other such procedures.
- Dates and other details of all treatments, including the name, dose, route, frequency, and duration of treatment with drugs
- or other medications.
- Follow-up exams to determine resolution of problem.

#### FACILITIES, GENERAL.

(3.125)(a) Structural strength. The facility must be constructed of such material and of such strength as appropriate for the animals involved. The indoor and outdoor housing facilities shall be structurally sound and shall be maintained in good repair to protect the animals from injury and to contain the animals.

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\*\*\*The wire fencing and posts for the camel pen (1 animal) are loose and some of the wiring have separated from the posts. The camel pen has an area behind the shed and along the south side where the fencing has separated from the post and has started sagging downward. All loose, weak, broken or sagging wire fencing and posts must be repaired or replaced and constructed of material which will provide structural strength at all times, kept in good repair to protect the animal from injury and contain the animal at all times. Affects 1 animals. Correct by 12/20/12.\*\*\*

### 3.131 (d) SANITATION.

(3.131)(d) Pest control. A safe and effective program for the control of insects, ectoparasites, and avian and mammalian pests shall be established and maintained.

\*\*\*The north corner building is used as a food storage and food preparation area. There is a high volume of flies and other insects inside the facility. Licensee indicated that a hanging pest control is used as a pest control program. The method of pest control could not be found to confirm it was being used. A large volume of flies and other insects could lead to spreading of diseases, pest infestation and other health hazards. There is also an increasing amount of items stored outside on the north end of the building. It was indicated that most of the items will be removed in a few weeks. Accumulation of items not used for food storage or animal husbandry practices could lead to pest/rodent infestation and nesting areas for pests/rodents. A stronger and more effective pest control program must be established and maintained at all times. All items not used for food storage or animal husbandry practices must also be removed for the overall health of the animals. Affects all animals. Correct by 12/20/12.\*\*\*
