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#### Feeding, section 3.129 (a)

--A trace mineral block was located directly on the ground in the enclosure containing 14 Fallow deer which exposes it to fecal contamination. This non-compliance was previously noted in the report for the 2-8-99 inspection.

#### Cleaning and Sanitation, section 3.131 (a)

--Excess build up of excreta has been a chronic problem at this facility. Today the camel shelter has a build up of feces in the area under the shelter. It was reported that it had not been cleaned since 3-29-99. Excessively soiled bedding or excess build up of excreta has previously been noted on inspection reports of 2-8-99, 10-16-97, 11-19-96, 8-1-96, 7-11-95, and 1-17-95.

## CATEGORY III: Non-compliant item(s) identified this inspection "D" Veterinary Care, section 2.40 (b)

-- The male lion named "Rhondo" was thin to the point that the ribs and hip bones were prominent. He was weak and had difficulty walking or even standing. His rear legs were not kept squarely under him (they were turned out) and he maintained a slightly crouched position with his rear limbs. He was observed wretching for a period of time and then vomited at least a cup of yellow-green fluid containing no solid ingesta. His tongue appeared pale (not as pink as it should be in a normal animal). There were no notations in the records on site indicating that the animal's deteriorating condition has been noticed or that the attending veterinarian had been contacted. The licensee is directed to obtain veterinary care by close of business on 4-3-99. The veterinary evaluation should include a CBC and Chemistry Panel (adequate to evaluate the kidney and liver function). The licensee is further directed to maintain records on site which are adequate to demonstrate that daily observation of all animals is performed to assess their health and well-being. This daily observation must be performed by a person adequately trained in animal husbandry so that they can make an accurate assessment of the health and wellbeing of the animals. A mechanism of direct and frequent communication is also required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian.
