The 11 corsican sheep were not observed during this inspection.

Accompanied on inspection by Ms. Jody Christiansen, Administrative Assistant, by Mr. Brian Hood, Animal Care Inspector with USDA, APHIS, AC, and during the latter part of the inspection also by Mr. Dave Freed, President.

CATEGORY III: Non-compliant item(s) identified this inspection Veterinary Care, section 2.40 (b)

--A buffalo cow underwent surgery to remove a rubber band embedded around a toe on 5-2-00. At that time she received an injectable antibiotic and pain medication. It was reported by Mr. Freed that the animal was obviously abnormal from that time until it was euthanized. As he described it, she could be observed holding her leg out in front of her. The daily records for the buffalo do not indicate any abnormalities except on 5-10-00 and 5-15-00. A billing statement indicated that the veterinarian examined the buffalo cow on 5-15-00 when she was given two types of injectable antibiotics, wound treatment, and another dose of pain

medication. There was no weekly veterinary visit, as called for in the written veterinary care program, from 5-15-00 to 6-1-00. On 6-1-00, it was determined that the infection was extending up the leg so the buffalo cow was euthanized. Ensure that the daily recorded animal observations and assessments accurately depict the condition of the animal so that the information relayed to the veterinarian is accurate and timely.

To be corrected by: 8-20-00

--The current written program of veterinary care for the hoofstock calls for weekly visits by the attending veterinarian. There were no regularly scheduled visits conducted between 5-15-00 and 6-1-00. The buffalo cow was euthanized on 6-1-00. The records do not indicate any treatment or examination between 5-15-00 and 6-1-00. The history of this cow's infected leg is further detailed in the above paragraph. Ensure that the written program of veterinary care is followed.

To be corrected by: Immediately

--The emergency response kit (kit with orange trays used for the Telinject) contained 3 tubes of Gentocin Ophthalmic Ointment which had exceeded the expiration date of 7/99. The tubes were not marked as expired and were not separated from other in-date products. It is unclear whether the veterinarian was aware that the medication was expired.

To be corrected by: 7-27-00

--The emergency kit used with the power driven injection system (kit with red trays) did not contain any sanitary needles for injection of the type reportedly typically used by the facility. There were needles of the type which they typically use present, but they were laying unprotected in a dusty tray. The facility reports that they may need to order new needles. Ensure that the needles required for emergency administration of anesthetics and tranquilizers are sanitary and ready for use.

Handling, section 2.131

--The section of chain link fence on one side of the fallow deer enclosure containing 22 fallow deer and on one side of the muntjac enclosure containing 3 new muntjacs is directly accessible to the public. A female patron was observed putting her fingers through the chain link fence into the muntjac enclosure. There are dispensers containing deer feed for sale in front of the fallow deer fence so that the patrons may feed the deer through the fence. There is no barrier fence to

prevent public contact with these animals and ensure the safety of animals and the public. There was no "responsible, knowledgeable, and readily identifiable employee or attendant" which was "present at all times during periods of public contact". There is reportedly an Area 3 Supervisor who roves an area which extends as far as approximately one city block away and an aerial gondola operator located approximately 70 foot away who is tasked with unloading the gondola at a maximum rate of up to every 12 seconds. Provide one of these two methods—barrier to prevent public contact or appropriate attendant present at all times.

To be corrected by: 8-31-00

--The enclosures containing the 3 llama and the 2 zebra have a chain link fence with direct public contact potential. These are located across from the stage coach ride and its waiting bench. See citation in above paragraph which quotes the requirements. Provide either a barrier to prevent public contact or an appropriate attendant present at all times to provide for the safety of the animals and the public.

NOTES:

- 1. Documents furnished to the facility and discussed on site included:
 - a. Tech Note--Animal Care. The facility was asked to have the attending veterinarians fill out the check sheet on the back of this form anytime they perform a health program review. These reviews must be performed at least once a year.
 - b. The updated version of Animal Care Policy #3 (Veterinary Care). This included discussing the sections on Health Records, Program of Veterinary Care, and Expired Medical Materials.
 - c. Animal Care Policy # 29 (Farm Animals Used for Nonagricultural Purposes).
- 2. Sections 2.50 and 2.75, which detail identification, acquisition records, and disposition records, were reviewed on site.
- 3. Records of the fallow deer necropsy subsequent to its death on 7-12-00 were not available during the inspection, nor was the information on the stillborn elk. The facility had agreed to fax these to the inspector for review.
